Caleb has been doing a lot of drawing with *metal insets*. He is working on the *sound game* and is getting ready for the *moveable alphabet*.

Claire has been reading using the *vowel cards* and word building with the *moveable alphabet*. She is beginning to do addition using the *golden bead material*.

Daniel has had many lessons. He works with the *cylinder blocks*

daily. He enjoys coloring, painting, watering plants and the *dressing frames*.

Ella likes using the *dressing* frames to practice buckles. She also enjoys using the screwdriver. She is working on recognizing the sounds within words with the "I Spy" game.

Ellyson has been working on reading with the *object box* and building words with the *moveable alphabet*. She is also working on *addition with the stripboard*.

Ethan has been coloring, water coloring, and stringing beads. He also had a lesson on the *buckle frame*.

Faith really enjoys many art activities. She paints daily, and she also likes the stamps and coloring. She has had lessons on *table washing, folding, and living and non-living cards*.

Jacob has been doing a lot of math work. He has done *multiplication* using the bead bars, and bead board. He is also beginning division with the stamp game.

Julia had a lesson on the *tying frame*. She is also working on

addition with the golden bead material.

Kyla has worked on the *dressing* frames. She likes the number memory game and she had lessons on the binomial cube and the spindle boxes.

Mabel likes the *cylinder blocks*. She has had many lessons in the practical life area such as, *open* and closing containers, the screwdriver, button frame, and washing leaves.

Norah has been working on the *sound game* and has been writing with the "*parts of*" *booklets*. She had a new lesson on *sewing a button*.

Peter had a new lesson on the *binomial cube and teen beads* (learning numbers 11-19).

Riley has been reading with the *object box*, memorizing *puzzle* words, and using the *golden bead* material to do addition.

Sidney enjoys matching with the *missing socks memory game*. She easel paints daily and she had a new lesson with the *fabric box* (Matching fabric pieces using a blindfold).

Will had a lesson on the *spindle* boxes and the color wheel. He enjoys water play and painting.

The following is just bit information that explains a little about the practical life and sensorial area.

Practical Life: All activities are designed to assist the child with some specific portion of his inner development.

- Development of mental order and the ability to concentrate.
- Mastery of body movements, both fine and large motor control.
- Gives the child the skills he needs to be an independent functioning person at school and home.
- Development of selfdiscipline, organization, self-esteem, socialization and independence.

Practical Life Materials:

Pouring

- Washing, scrubbing
- Polishing
- Dusting
- Dressing frames
- Sewing
- Watering plants

Sensorial Area: The primary aim is to help the child classify and catalogue his sensory impressions. The secondary aim is to improve the quality of the sensory abstractions and prepare the mind with greater sensitivity to small differences. Sensorial materials assist the child to develop all his senses.
